IRREPLACEABLE. With less than 2% of the Pine Rockland habitat remaining in Miami-Dade County, this parcel is simply too precious to be used for a residential and retail development that can go elsewhere. Alternative Habitat for the multiple endangered species — two butterflies, one bat, one beetle and numerous plant species — cannot be replicated.

UNREALISTIC. The proximity of residential housing units will complicate and likely render impossible the controlled burns needed to maintain the Pine Rockland habitat and that are called for in the Habitat Conservation Plan. This has been the case in numerous county-maintained Pine Rocklands near single-family residences, and will be even more so near Coral Reef Commons' planned dense residential area. This plan may look good on paper, but is entirely unrealistic.

INSUPPORTABLE. If the HCP is accepted as drafted the Service will issue an Incidental Take Permit (ITP) for the following species: Florida Leafwing Butterfly; Bartram's Scrub-Hairstreak Butterfly; Florida Bonneted Bat; Rim Rock Crowned Snake; Gopher Tortoise; Eastern Indigo Snake and the Miami Tiger Beetle.

How can the Fish and Wildlife Service allow the "take" of these threatened and endangered species when so little alternative habitat exists? This "allowed take" is insupportable. How will the Service achieve its mandate of ensuring that these species not only survive, but also recover to the point where the protections of the Endangered Species Act are no longer needed?

DISINGENUOUS. The amount of proposed mitigation for the subject project is woefully insufficient, especially when compared to the amount of habitat proposed to be taken. The Coral Reef Commons Project claims to set aside more than 100 acres in mitigation, however, 50 of these acres are already under obligatory conservation management by the University of Miami and, as such, represent no real incremental increase in lands under conservation management. Double-dipping in this manner would further compromise endangered and threatened species.

Dear Fish and Wildlife Service scientists,

I am writing to express the strong opinion that the Walmart proposed for the south Miami-Dade rocklands should not be approved unless and until:

- Plans are revised by an ecologist to provide habitat for wildlife flora and fauna, including corridors and other support for ecosystem functions, without fragmentation;
- Monoculture lawns and any other landscaping are disallowed to replace the natural habitat of the tract. Of course this will save the need for watering and constant energy-intensive mowing, pest removal, and maintenance;
- The site plan does not create a heat island; and
- Light pollution in that area should be minimized so as to allow nocturnal foraging and hunting.

I would suggest the development first of an ecological risk conceptual model as a basis for the assessment, and a projection that minimum viable populations of keystone species can be maintained.

Such an approach would not be expensive, can address concerns that arise if this project is to move forward, and can serve as example for future development in the region.

As a fourth generation Miamian, stories of the natural beauty that once was has been ever present in my perception of my home.

Please do not let the Richmond Pine Rocklands be added to the list of what once was.

The case seems clear: at least **five endangered species**, including the Miami Tiger Beetle, the Atala Butterfly, the Rim Rock Crowned Snake, the Florida Leafwing Butterfly, and the Florida Bonneted Bat call this area home. Only 2% of this ecosystem, which once covered the landscape, remains outside of the Everglades National Park.

I mistakenly thought that South Florida could not be any more developed. I was wrong. It seems that our local universities and commissioners couldn't even see the value of that remaining 2% of undeveloped Pine Rockland habitat!

Ah, the developers claim that they will set aside land as a nature preserve to allow the continued survival of these species?! Surely, if more than half of these creatures' remaining sparse habitat is paved over for a Wal-Mart, LA Fitness, fast food restaurants, and 900 apartments, I have *no hope* for their continued survival.

I recently lived in Atlanta for my doctoral studies. In the suburbs where I lived there, a new shopping center opened last year. What does it contain? A Wal-Mart and an LA Fitness. I am tired of living in a country that looks the same everywhere I go. I am currently living abroad, conducting research for my dissertation. In conversation, I find that what people associate most readily with the United States of America is our natural beauty. Please uphold the mission of your federal agency to preserve that natural beauty in favor of a concrete jungle that is the same everywhere you go.

I implore you to uphold your agency's mission, as stated on its facebook page, of "working with others to conserve, protect, and enhance fish, wildlife, plants, and their habitats for the continuing benefit of the American people" by **not approving Ram Realty Services' "Coral Reef Commons"** project. Surely, even if smaller tracts of land are set aside for nature preserves, the construction and perpetual use of the proposed building projects would do anything but protect, preserve, and *enhance* the rare wildlife and plants of the Richmond Pine Rocklands.

As a native Floridian and long-time resident of Miami-Dade County, I would like to voice my concerns regarding the development along SW 152 Avenue (Coral Reef Drive) in Miami-Dade County, FL, known locally as Coral Reef Commons. This is the site of a proposed Walmart, LA

Fitness, Chick-fil-A, and an apartment complex.

I am a botanist and author of ***Everglades Wildflowers*** and other popular Florida wildflower and exploring guides, and am also a charter member of the Florida Native Plant Society along with being a member of Tropical Audubon Society's Board of Directors and a member of the plant list committee for the Florida Exotic Pest Plant Council.

The development known as Coral Reef Commons is a part of a larger pine rockland parcel known as the Richmond Pineland Complex that encompasses Zoo Miami, University of Miami property, U.S. Coast Guard property, the Luis Martinez Army Reserve Base, the Robert Morgan Vocational School, and a large Miami-Dade County Park called Larry & Penny Thompson Park. Globally imperiled pine rockland habitat occurs on all of those properties and I have photographed the federal endangered deltoid spurge (***Chamaesyce deltoidea*** subsp. ***deltoidea***) and the federal threatened Mosier's false boneset or Florida brickellbush (***Brickellia mosieri***) within Larry & Penny Thompson Park, Zoo Miami, the U.S. Coast Guard property, and on the Luis Martinez Army Reserve Base, so it is difficult to believe that these two federally-protected taxa do not occur on the property owned by Coral Reef Commons. Much of that property is degraded but, with proper resource management, coupled with the introduction of prescribed fire, it is highly likely that these and other protected plants would be present in the soil seed bank. There are numerous state-listed threatened and endangered species throughout the Richmond Pineland Complex and, being surrounded by a sea of development, the habitat serves as a critically important natural area for resident and migratory birds as well as other wildlife. The federally-listed Florida bonneted bat and the Miami tiger beetle also occur within the Richmond Pineland Complex.

One important concern is that the University of Miami is now offering 50 acres of pine rockland habitat as a preserve to help mitigate the loss of habitat from the proposed development. Pine rockland habitat cannot exist as a viable plant community without fire, and pine rockland habitat historically burned on a 3 to 5 year frequency, which is the preferred

time frame for conducting prescribed burns in the absence of naturally-occurring wildfires. As a former naturalist and resource manager for Miami-Dade Parks Department, I do not see how prescribed burns on 50 acres could possibly be conducted adjacent to a Walmart, LA Fitness, a restaurant, and apartment buildings. And, without fire, the viability of the habitat is jeopardized through natural succession. If this natural succession is allowed to occur, the maturing understory will create a major fire hazard should there be a wildfire (which is a 100% chance) and a hot wildfire with a heavy fuel load will kill the slash pine overstory and would pose a serious danger to nearby homes and businesses.

In short, this development is unacceptable on a number of issues and should be denied. At the very least, there should be a public hearing so the people can voice their concerns. Traffic gridlock created by this development would be a major concern for all residents in the vicinity.

I respectfully request a local public hearing on the above-referenced proposed incidental take permit and environmental assessment on the commercial mixed-use development locally known as Coral Reef Commons. We request that this public hearing take place during the comment period and in a location and timeframe that ensures members of the public will be able to meaningfully participate.

As you are aware, native habitats in Florida are rapidly disappearing. Perennially rare communities, such as the pine rocklands that would be impacted by Coral Reef Commons, are among the native habitats in Florida that have been drastically reduced in area. Pine rockland is a globally endangered plant community with more than 98 percent decline in its pre-settlement area due to significant ecological degradation, conversion to other land uses, and outright destruction. This important community provides vital habitat for many endangered species, including those at issue in this permit application.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service's (Service) review of the Coral Reef Commons application requires compliance with the Endangered Species Act, National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA), and Administrative Procedure Act. The Service's Habitat Conservation Planning and Incidental Take Permit Processing Handbook (2016) (hereinafter, Handbook), a policy document intended to inform how the Service processes Endangered Species Act Section 10 incidental take permits, describes public hearings as:

[a] common method for soliciting stakeholder input on agency actions. Hearings provide all or selected participants an opportunity to present their opinions on an issue, usually in a formal manner in an allotted amount of time The information is recorded and becomes part of the public record. Laws and agency regulations often mandate public hearings.

Likewise, the Handbook describes public meetings as:

[f]orums in which our staff can present information to interested stakeholders. Many public meetings . . . are designed to encourage discussion and feedback. Public meetings can be very effective and useful for conveying information, educating the interested public, and identifying interested parties.

This guidance echoes the requirements of NEPA, which at every turn emphasize the importance of public participation. The Council on Environmental Quality's (CEQ) regulations implementing NEPA state that "[a]ccurate scientific analysis, expert agency comments, and public scrutiny are essential to implementing NEPA." 40 C.F.R. § 1500.1. Indeed, CEQ regulations require that the Service hold a public hearing or meeting "whenever appropriate," taking into account factors such as "substantial environmental controversy concerning the proposed action or substantial interest in holding the hearing." 40 C.F.R. § 1506.6(c)(1).

I have a longstanding interest in the protection of Pine Rocklands and their endangered and threatened species. I have also have carefully followed years of additional requests for more Pine Rockland Protection.

For example, in 2014, the Center for Biological Diversity, South Florida Wildlands Association, Tropical Audubon Society, Miami Blue Chapter of the North American Butterfly Association and Miami Pine Rocklands Coalition petitioned the Service to list the Miami tiger beetle, one of the species impacted by the incidental take permit, as endangered. Additionally, as the result of a settlement agreement reached between the Center for Biological Diversity and the Service in 2011, the Service listed the Florida bonneted bat as endangered in 2013 ; listed as endangered and designated critical habitat for the Bartram's scrub-hairstreak butterfly and Florida leafwing butterfly in 2014 ; and listed as endangered and designated critical habitat for the Carter's small-flowered flax and Florida brickell-bush in 2015. All are species that would be negatively impact by Coral Reef Commons.

I understand there have been more than 14,000 letters to the developer of Coral Reef Commons asking it to protect listed species and not move forward with the project. Many concerned residents appear to oppose the project and would benefit from the opportunity to attend a public hearing on the application.

It is evident that a substantial environmental controversy concerning the proposed action and a substantial interest in holding the hearing exist.

We hope you will grant the public the opportunity to more fully discuss the impacts of Coral

Reef Commons on federal and state endangered and threatened species through a public hearing. I look forward to your reply.

In addition, I'd also like to request the Public Comment Period be extended to 90 days to allow the Public to carefully examine the proposed Coral Reef Commons HCP in light of the more than 3 years the applicants have had to develop it jointly with the FWS.







Dear Fish and Wildlife Service scientists,

I am writing to express the strong opinion that the Walmart proposed for the south Miami-Dade rocklands should not be approved unless and until:

- Plans are revised by an ecologist to provide habitat for wildlife flora and fauna, including corridors and other support for ecosystem functions, without fragmentation;
- Monoculture lawns and any other landscaping are disallowed to replace the natural habitat of the tract. Of course this will save the need for watering and constant energy-intensive mowing, pest removal, and maintenance;
- The site plan does not create a heat island; and
- Light pollution in that area should be minimized so as to allow nocturnal foraging and hunting.

I would suggest the development first of an ecological risk conceptual model as a basis for the assessment, and a projection that minimum viable populations of keystone species can be maintained.

Such an approach would not be expensive, can address concerns that arise if this project is to move forward, and can serve as example for future development in the region.

As a fourth generation Miamian, stories of the natural beauty that once was has been ever present in my perception of my home.

Please do not let the Richmond Pine Rocklands be added to the list of what once was.

The case seems clear: at least **five endangered species**, including the Miami Tiger Beetle, the Atala Butterfly, the Rim Rock Crowned Snake, the Florida Leafwing Butterfly, and the Florida Bonneted Bat call this area home. Only 2% of this ecosystem, which once covered the landscape, remains outside of the Everglades National Park.

I mistakenly thought that South Florida could not be any more developed. I was wrong. It seems that our local universities and commissioners couldn't even see the value of that remaining 2% of undeveloped Pine Rockland habitat!

Ah, the developers claim that they will set aside land as a nature preserve to allow the continued survival of these species?! Surely, if more than half of these creatures' remaining sparse habitat is paved over for a Wal-Mart, LA Fitness, fast food restaurants, and 900 apartments, I have *no hope* for their continued survival.

I recently lived in Atlanta for my doctoral studies. In the suburbs where I lived there, a new shopping center opened last year. What does it contain? A Wal-Mart and an LA Fitness. I am tired of living in a country that looks the same everywhere I go. I am currently living abroad, conducting research for my dissertation. In conversation, I find that what people associate

most readily with the United States of America is our natural beauty. Please uphold the mission of your federal agency to preserve that natural beauty in favor of a concrete jungle that is the same everywhere you go.

I implore you to uphold your agency's mission, as stated on its facebook page, of "working with others to conserve, protect, and enhance fish, wildlife, plants, and their habitats for the continuing benefit of the American people" by **not approving Ram Realty Services' "Coral Reef Commons"** project. Surely, even if smaller tracts of land are set aside for nature preserves, the construction and perpetual use of the proposed building projects would do anything but protect, preserve, and *enhance* the rare wildlife and plants of the Richmond Pine Rocklands.

Please support the conservation of our last remaining pieces of Pine Rockland.

With less than 2% of the Pine Rockland habitat remaining in Miami-Dade County, the parcel that RAM and UM are considering to develop into a 137-acre mixed-use development to include a WALMART and 900 residential housing units is simply too precious to be used for a residential and retail development that can go elsewhere. Alternative Habitat for the multiple endangered species — two butterflies, one bat, one beetle and numerous plant species — cannot be replicated.

The proximity of residential housing units will complicate and likely render impossible the controlled burns needed to maintain the Pine Rockland habitat and that are called for in the Habitat Conservation Plan. This has been the case in numerous county-maintained Pine Rocklands near single-family residences, and will be even more so near Coral Reef Commons' planned dense residential area. This plan may look good on paper, but is entirely unrealistic.

If the HCP is accepted as drafted the Service will issue an Incidental Take Permit (ITP) for the following species: Florida Leafwing Butterfly; Bartram's Scrub-Hairstreak Butterfly; Florida Bonneted Bat; Rim Rock Crowned Snake; Gopher Tortoise; Eastern Indigo Snake and the Miami Tiger Beetle. This "allowed take" is insupportable.

The amount of proposed mitigation for the subject project is woefully insufficient, especially when compared to the amount of habitat proposed to be taken. The Coral Reef Commons Project claims to set aside more than 100 acres in mitigation, however, 50 of these acres are already under obligatory conservation management by the University of Miami and, as such, represent no real incremental increase in lands under conservation management. Double-dipping in this manner would further compromise endangered and threatened species.
